INTRODUCTION

A common phrase heard among brothers in Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia is "Once a Sinfonian, always a Sinfonian." It is the spirit of this phrase that has fostered loyal alumni Sinfonians for more than one hundred years. The alumni Sinfonian looks to the lessons introduced in his college days for inspiration and strength throughout his daily life. Yet, while probationary and collegiate memberships are the core experiences for a lifetime journey in Sinfonia, the participation of the alumni member is not passive or secondary. He assumes the vital role of supporting the Fraternity's continued efforts to build musical students into men of high ideals and of ensuring that the Sinfonia experience is available for generations of students to come. Sinfonia's sixth Supreme President, Percy Jewett Burrell, wrote in 1910, "As students we were in the 'getting' business; as alumni we should be in the 'giving' business." Alumni membership in Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia provides the possibility to give back to the Fraternity and its collegiate membership all of the benefits of the life-changing lessons learned through probationary and active membership. All Sinfonians are called upon to achieve the fullest potential of this possibility by making the most of their post-collegiate participation."

Alumni are a reflection of our past, a representation of our present, and a link to our future. This vision of a fraternity that fosters ongoing relationships through an environment that invites, supports, and presupposes post-collegiate involvement and interaction on local, regional, and national levels is critical to the future of our Order. Every chapter has alumni, and every collegiate member will become an alumnus of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. While the probationary and collegiate membership experiences provide the foundation for a lifetime journey in Sinfonia, the alumni experience can be the most substantial. Continued involvement in Sinfonia after graduation is an expectation and obligation of membership.

HISTORY OF THE PROVINCE ALUMNI COORDINATOR

The idea for the Province Alumni Coordinator emerged from the work of the 1997-2000 triennium's Alumni Affairs Committee, which piloted the program in two provinces with great success. The program remained a pilot program until the 2003 National Assembly, when the delegate body voted to more formally recognize through resolution the position, and its potential significance to Sinfonia across the nation. The position of the Province Alumni Coordinator acknowledges the overwhelming amount of work that needs to be done in cultivating positive alumni relations throughout the country that a very limited national staff and national leadership structure cannot address alone.

Resolution of the 2003 National Assembly

The 2003 National Assembly could go down in history as one where there was a clear mandate to improve the alumni experience in the Fraternity. Legislation was passed clarifying the role and purpose of alumni associations and encouraging members to affiliate with alumni associations upon graduation. The Assembly also gave provinces the right to add alumni associations to their province councils and amended the Alumni Relations Officer position to have more specific responsibilities. However, the cornerstone of developing relationships with the alumni was based on the establishment of the Province Alumni Coordinator position. The Assembly unanimously passed the following resolution:

- Whereas, Sinfonia is a life-long journey in practice and philosophy;
- Whereas, Sinfonian experiences are built on fraternal rather than organizational relationships;
- Whereas, It is Sinfonia's ongoing responsibility to identify and cultivate leaders - both collegiate and alumni;
- Whereas, Sinfonia's current infrastructure is stretched beyond capacity;
- Whereas, Investment in alumni resources encourages and promotes a system of ongoing involvement and interaction among all Sinfonians in all situations of life;
- Whereas, Alumni can provide Sinfonia with a vast pool of resources, among which are manpower, expertise, and financial support; therefore be it

Resolved, That Sinfonia endorses the concept of the Province Alumni Coordinator by encouraging the expansion of the Province Alumni Coordinator position to each province under the direction of the province's leadership.

With the support and encouragement of the National President and the National Executive Committee, as well as the province leadership, the number of Province Alumni Coordinators soon after the National Convention nearly tripled. As the position continues to define itself as a critical part of an overall strong alumni affairs program, the number of provinces with this position is expected to continue to grow.

The 2006 National Assembly

At the 2006 Convention, the National Assembly fully recognized the Province Alumni Coordinator as a province officer in the governing documents of the Fraternity.

Role of the Province Alumni Coordinator

The role of the Province Alumni Coordinator within the province is to establish new relationships and reestablish relationships with alumni Sinfonians residing in the province. The PAC should reach out to as many alumni during his term as possible and establish himself as a primary point of contact for alumni and a resource of information that would interest alumni.

STRUCTURE

Term of Office

The Province Alumni Coordinator is appointed for a three-year term, usually at the beginning of a triennium. If the office becomes vacant during the triennium, it is up to the province governor whether the successor assumes the position for the remainder of the triennium or begins a new three-year term.

Overview of Duties

The Province Alumni Coordinator serves the Fraternity on all levels: locally, provincially, and nationally. They also impact both the collegiate and alumni infrastructure of the Fraternity. The specific goals of each individual PAC is determined by the Province Governor. Below are some ideas on where a PAC can best contribute to the Fraternity's alumni program.

- Service for Chapters
 - Supporting and training the Alumni Relations Officer
 - Educating chapters in the value of alumni participation
 - Attending chapter functions
 - Assisting chapters in planning alumni events
 - Developing relationships with university alumni affairs offices
 - Connecting graduating brothers to area alumni
- Service for Alumni Associations
 - Maintaining visibility with alumni associations
 - Encouraging expansion and creation of alumni associations
 - Coordinating interaction between alumni associations
 - Coordinating interaction between chapters and alumni associations
 - Identifying potential leaders and contacts for future alumni groups
- Service for Individual Alumni
 - Planning alumni events
 - Developing a knowledge base of individual alumni interests and skills in the province
 - Connecting alumni resources to enhance chapter education
 - Updating contact information of alumni

- Communicating with province alumni
- Networking with alumni at professional conventions
- Service for the Province
 - Assisting with training at province events
 - Being actively involved with the province council
 - Advocating for the needs of province alumni at the national level
- Service for the National Fraternity
 - Submitting articles for national publications
 - Communicating and training with other PACs
 - Maintaining a close relationship with the National Alumni Affairs Committee

Each of these is described in more detail in later sections of this manual. It is up to the province leadership, i.e. the province governor to determine the priorities of the province and which of these duties should be accomplished first. The Province Alumni Coordinator must file a report of his activities with the Province Governor.

Organizational Structure

The Province Alumni Coordinator (PAC) plays a role in the existing province leadership structure. The PAC is appointed by the Province Governor (PG) who oversees the PAC's work throughout his term of office. The PG should be his primary point of contact. The PAC acts in an advisory capacity in order to help chapters and associations within his province to improve alumni relations. He should take the initiative to create programs to help the province further realize the benefits of a vibrant alumni program. If, in the course of the PAC's activities, he becomes aware of situations that are detrimental to the welfare of a chapter or the province, he should report the situation to the PG. As much as possible, the PAC should refrain from being used as an administrative arm of the Fraternity. This will help maintain the positive atmosphere surrounding the position and ensure the success of alumni-relationship building in the province.

The PAC is not alone, as there are other men serving in the same capacity in other provinces across the country. He should build a relationship with the other PACs for the purpose of sharing ideas. He should make himself available for training opportunities as they are developed. All PACs will be a part of the PAC email listserv, which will allow PACs to interact with each other.

The most important contact at the National Headquarters is the Director of Alumni Affairs. The Director will have his pulse on what is happening nationally with alumni and will be an invaluable resource for getting information and accessing the resources available through the headquarters.

Training

One of the keys to creating successful officers is to make sure that they are properly trained. In addition to this manual, there will be opportunities for PACs to engage in both formal and informal training. Formal training may involve sessions or retreats at a central location, while informal opportunities include the need to stay abreast of developments in the Fraternity's overall alumni program. As a province officer, the PAC should also make himself familiar with all of the policies and procedures of the Fraternity, especially the National Constitution and the General Regulations for Collegiate Chapters.

DUTIES

The duties of the Province Alumni Coordinator cover several different areas of the Fraternity. The PAC provides services at all levels of the organization, including the individual alumnus, the chapter, the association, the province, and the National Fraternity.

Service For Collegiate Chapters Supporting and training the Alumni Relations Officer

At the chapter level, the Alumni Relations Officer is the officer who is responsible for developing a vibrant alumni program for the chapter's alumni as well as the alumni living in the area. The *General Regulations for Collegiate Chapters* defines the role of the Alumni Relations Officer as follows:

The Alumni Relations Officer shall compile and maintain an accurate list of names and addresses of all former members of the chapter and of other alumni Sinfonians in the vicinity. He shall notify the National Headquarters of any changes in the addresses, as well as any chapters or associations in other localities of his own chapter's alumni moving into their geographic areas. He shall be responsible for the creation and distribution of an alumni newsletter annually. He shall assist in the coordination of the chapter's alumni functions, and shall regularly inform and invite local and chapter alumni to chapter events. He shall act as a liaison between the chapter and any associations in his locality. He shall perform such other local duties as his collegiate chapter may designate but shall hold no other chapter office.

The PAC should work closely with each Alumni Relations Officer to provide database support; including assisting him with accessing addresses from the National Headquarters and helping him establish a relationship with the university's alumni affairs office. He can assist with the planning of chapter alumni events as well as educating chapters on how to incorporate alumni and chapter-sponsored events. The PAC will provide guidance for Alumni Relations Officers on how to create quality alumni publications. The *Guide to Alumni Relations Officer's Duties* contains detailed instructions on how to accomplish the duties of the office. The PAC should be familiar with this document and use this as a springboard for training.

Educating chapters in the value of alumni participation

Individual chapters may have limited involvement with chapter or local alumni and may not recognize the value of involving alumni in their activities. The PAC can serve as a visible, positive model for the potential of what an alumnus can offer a chapter. To that end, he may meet with chapters to educate them on the value of alumni and how to tap their expertise to improve their fraternal experience as he educates the collegiate body about the value of alumni participation. There are several ideas that the PAC can discuss:

- Basic Information and Statistics: Number of alumni in the province, number in the local area, nearest alumni group, etc.
- Excerpt from *Themes for Brotherhood*.
 - "Probationary and collegiate membership are core experiences for a lifetime journey in Sinfonia; at the same time the participation of the alumni member is not passive or secondary. He assumes the vital role of supporting the Fraternity's efforts to build musical students into men of high ideals, and of ensuring that the Sinfonia experience is available for generations of students yet to come."
 - This statement aims to speak to the newest member at their earliest entrance into Sinfonia about the importance of the lifelong journey that these men are embarking upon, and as PAC this is that illustration brought to life. The PAC is a real person bringing real stories to both the collegiate and probationary members about how someone remains involved throughout their lives. Conveying this message is one of the most important duties the PAC will engage in, both by his presence and work with the chapters and their brothers.
- Important points about the position of Alumni Relations Officer

- The national Fraternity puts forth the office of Alumni Relations Officer as one of the most vital in the chapter, but it is often neglected on the local level. Changing established mindsets about this position at the chapter level by demonstrating how the position works and how it can directly impact the local chapter will go a long way towards taking the mystery out of the office of Alumni Relations Officer. Collegiate brothers by nature think of the future in terms of days or weeks, and it may be difficult for them to realize the importance of a position where the work impacts people many of the brothers have never met. Again, the PAC's presence brings to life a real person who benefits from these efforts. Making the job real and manageable will help to elevate its status as a key position in any chapter.
- Remember that everyone in a chapter can and should be fostering good alumni relations and programming, NOT just the Alumni Relations Officer. He has an important and unique role in coordinating alumni affairs, but the success of a chapter's alumni relations program is not his sole responsibility. The chapter's role in planning and executing a first rate graduation ceremony or an alumni-themed event are ways in which the entire chapter should be involved. The PAC would not expect one person to plan all aspects of a province workshop, and alumni programming should be treated no differently in terms of planning and execution. Each member should be considered an ambassador of his chapter when he meets other Sinfonians, and the way the brothers project themselves toward alumni sets a tone for inclusiveness in those activities. For example, something as simple as making sure that, when alumni come to an event, all brothers introduce themselves and find out information about them makes those alumni feel welcome and a part of the festivities.
- The core of an effective alumni program is RELATIONSHIPS. Again, instilling the idea that ALL brothers are ambassadors of the chapter, and building those relationships positively means being welcoming and inclusive when alumni are present. If you are at an alumni-sponsored event, are the alumni seated separately from the collegiate members, or are they interspersed with one another? Are events planned at reasonable hours (NOT after 9:00 pm, although parties may be an exception to this) so that alumni can make a reasonable attempt to attend? Are alumni kept abreast of what is happening with the local chapter so they CAN attend events of interest to them? These questions are all good points to consider with each chapter as you work with them to improve alumni relationships.
- Keys to unlocking the potential of our post-collegiate membership: What attitude and approach are necessary?
 - RETHINK: Our attitude towards post-collegiate membership is evident in how we act (our actions show what is important to us).
 - RESPECT: Respect what it means to be an alumnus. An alumnus is similar to being a collegiate member in many ways, yet he is further along in his life journey. Alumnus may be "other" but not a "foreigner"
 - RELATE: Be in touch with the world of your alumni; relationship is the root of Sinfonia... Brotherhood is a chosen relationship with kindred spirits; this is the foundation upon which everything about Fraternity relies. It's about people first, not programs.

Attending chapter functions

The PAC should be a visible entity in the province. Attending chapter functions is a wonderful way to achieve that visibility. The PAC should acquire the calendar of events or activities list from chapters in the province and plan periodic visits to chapters throughout the year. The PAC should make every effort to attend the chapter's Ceremony for Graduating Brothers. By being present at this event, the PAC can facilitate linking graduating Sinfonians to alumni opportunities in the area in which they will be residing.

Assisting chapters in planning alumni events

Chapters often have important events or milestones that celebrate the history and longevity of the chapter's existence. Alumni are directly responsible for the chapter being where they are today. Chapters are strongly encouraged to plan at least one alumni-related event each school year, in addition to chapter celebrations or events. The PAC can be a valuable

resource in assisting chapters in the sometimes overwhelming task of event planning. The PAC can provide perspective in terms of when to schedule events, what time of day, how to advertise the event, as well as how to solicit alumni input into what they might be interested in participating. The PAC can help the chapter in determining the scope of the event, how to find locations to host events and how to interact with the location's management, how far in advance to send out invitations to events, how many notices about the event should be sent out, how to prepare financially for the event, etc.

Developing relationships with university alumni affairs offices

The organizational structure at any university can be frustratingly hard to penetrate to access the resources chapters may need, particularly alumni contact information. The PAC can be an invaluable resource as an officer of the province to help chapters access vital contact information, or to provide assistance with mailings.

Connecting graduating brothers to area alumni

A critical activity for the Fraternity's alumni program is maintaining contact with its alumni. Brothers need to realize that Sinfonia is more than just a collegiate experience – it is a lifetime journey. The transition from collegiate to alumni member is a difficult one for many Sinfonians. Many times, brothers are not aware of the opportunities and the vast network of Sinfonians available to them. The PAC can help facilitate this connection by:

- Keeping track of the graduating brothers in the province each semester.
- Following up with these brothers after they have graduated to be sure their contact information in MyDesktop is up to date.
- Letting brothers know what alumni associations and other alumni events are in the area.
- Educating brothers on opportunities for continued involvement in the Fraternity through volunteering and other support.

Service For Alumni Associations

Maintaining visibility with alumni associations

The PAC should be a contributing member of his local alumni association if one exists. He also should also make an effort to visit each association in his province at least once per year, and maintain regular contact with them.

Encouraging expansion and creation of alumni associations

The alumni association is the formal vehicle that the Fraternity uses to promote the Sinfonian experience after graduation. The PAC should look for opportunities to expand the number of associations in his provinces so that graduating brothers have a group with which they may affiliate after their collegiate years. The PAC should be familiar with the Alumni Association Resource Guide and be a support resource for alumni Sinfonians who wish to form an interest group. While the PAC can help with the beginning stages of an association, it is important that he find others to serve in the core group of the alumni association. This will allow the PAC to focus on his other duties in the province.

Coordinating interaction between alumni associations

Communication and interaction make fraternal gatherings and experiences beneficial to our members. Alumni associations should be aware of what each other are doing, particularly if there is more than one association or interest group in the province. If logistically possible, joint events can be beneficial. The ability to exchange ideas and learn from one another can also benefit both groups and make them stronger, as province interaction does for our collegiate chapters. The PAC can be the person who facilitates this interaction.

Coordinating interaction between chapters and alumni associations

We are all Sinfonians even though we may be in different stages of our lives. Thinking of the collegiate experience as being completely separate from the alumni experience will not benefit the Fraternity in the long-run. We should encourage chapters and alumni associations to interact with one another. Chapters can benefit from the knowledge and experience of alumni and may need assistance in thinking about what types of events would be appropriate or how to

plan events effectively with an alumni association and vice versa. Alumni can renew their interest in participating actively by attending collegiate events.

Identifying potential leaders and contacts for future alumni groups

One of the most difficult tasks in forming an alumni association is identifying core group members who are willing to dedicate the time and energy to get a group started and keep it running. There will always be administrative tasks with any organization, and it is important to refresh alumni groups continuously with new people to help shoulder these responsibilities. As PAC, alumni who reside in the local area of an association may contact you. By linking these members with the association, you are helping to provide for the future of the association by assisting in replenishing their membership.

Service For Individual Alumni

Planning alumni events

The PAC should promote alumni interaction. This does not necessarily have to take the form of an alumni association interest meeting and could be something as simple as a sponsored happy hour in a location where there are a lot of Sinfonians. These gatherings are great opportunities to reconnect alumni with the Fraternity and to inform them of other opportunities for involvement. The key to planning these events is to promote them often and with plenty of advance notice (at least 6-8 weeks). It is also important to be organized. Preview the location for your event and make sure that it is suitable for a positive fraternal experience.

Developing a resource of individual alumni interests, skills, and resources in the province

Because the PAC is the person meeting and greeting alumni from all over the province, he is in a unique position to be able to recommend ideas for programs at all levels of the Fraternity. For example, he may have met someone at a recent happy hour that does leadership development for a living and can facilitate a program at the local chapter. As the PAC meets alumni during his term in office, he may want to keep a database that includes what special skills or resources particular alumni have that may be useful to a chapter, association, or province at some point.

Connecting alumni resources to enhance chapter education

As you develop a knowledge base of individual alumni skills and develop a relationship with chapters, you will find yourself in the unique position of being able to bring alumni skills and knowledge together to help collegiate chapters and their needs. It is these beneficial interactions that make the collegiate chapter think positively about alumni and then want to become involved when they become alumni themselves.

Updating contact information of alumni

Reconnecting those that have become "lost" is something that you can do that will have a huge impact in the Fraternity's ability to communicate with its membership. Generally speaking, 10% of the Fraternity's database of addresses needs to be updated every year. That is 10,000 records that would cost the Fraternity \$2,500 each year to update. Keep a notebook with you when you are at functions where Sinfonians could potentially be present. Get updated addresses and be sure to notify National Headquarters of the changes. As you meet alumni, you may want to ask them if they know other alumni in the area, who could give you new addresses, and also potential new contacts. Such connections could get you in touch with many people and yield positive results with a minimum amount of effort.

Communicating with province alumni

The alumni living in your province is your major sphere of influence. Make it your goal to connect with every mailable alumnus in your province during your term of office. This could be through email, newsletter, and through personal contact. Also make it a goal to reconnect as many lost alumni as you can during that time. Make sure that they are well informed of events in your province and alumni related news in the Fraternity as whole. Frequent contact will be the best way to build and maintain relationships with these alumni.

Networking with alumni at professional conventions

Professional music conventions are densely populated with Sinfonians. However, for many of them, the Fraternity was something “they did while they were in school”. It is your job to correct that assertion. Most alumni you meet will be happy to reminisce and be reconnected to Fraternity, and this may be your way “in” to get them to consider future involvement.

Service For The Province

Assisting with training at province events

Encourage your province governor to have some alumni-focused sessions at the annual province workshop. These could include Alumni Relations Officer training, event planning, and effective publications, to name a few. As more alumni attend the province workshop, think about activities that would appeal to them too. Those activities may include seminars on how to form an association, general information sharing about how and who to contact at the National Headquarters about various issues, and social activities for alumni.

Being actively involved with the province council

In order to continue to promote the Fraternity as a lifetime experience for both collegiate and alumni members, the responsibility to connect is a two-way street. Yes, collegiate chapters should reach out to their alumni (and those who live in the area) and invite them to events. Alumni should also make an effort to show that they want to stay involved. As PAC, you are the role model on how an alumnus can positively affect the Fraternity. Help make certain that alumni issues are a part of the province’s strategic direction by being an active participant in the province council and other activities, as well as encouraging the alumni associations to be in attendance.

Advocating the needs of province alumni at the national level

The Fraternity is always learning and we have many in the leadership working to make Sinfonia the best experience possible for all members, both alumni and collegiate. As someone who communicates with alumni Sinfonians regularly, you can provide additional perspective and ideas to the leadership of the Fraternity as it works to develop a vibrant alumni program.

Service For The National Fraternity

Submitting articles for national publications

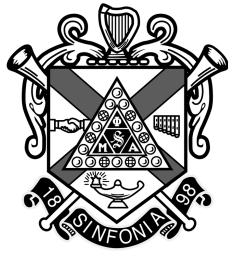
We are always looking for content for our Fraternity publications. Contribute an article annually for publication on alumni activities in your province. Use the same concepts we teach alumni secretaries about their alumni publications and develop alumni-centric content for the Sinfonian. Ads or articles in the Red & Black will capture graduating seniors’ attention and give them a person to contact if they move into the PAC’s province.

Communicating and training with other Province Alumni Coordinators

The PAC listserv will enable PACs to communicate with one another. As each PAC goes out and gains experience, he should share the experiences with others so that each PAC can learn from one another. If you are not on this listserv, please call the National Headquarters to be added.

Maintaining a close relationship with the National Alumni Affairs Committee

The role of the Alumni Affairs Committee is to be an advisory body to the National Executive Committee. The AAC is happy to discuss ideas for programs that could potentially become a part of the Fraternity’s alumni program, and will be eager to hear your input.



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CITATION FOR ALUMNI RELATIONS

Chapters to be considered for the **CITATION FOR ALUMNI RELATIONS** must supply the following information in its entirety, endorsed by the chapter president and the faculty advisor, to the province governor no later than May 1 with supporting documentation attached. **NO CONSIDERATION WILL BE GIVEN IF CITATIONS ARE INCOMPLETE, ARE POSTMARKED AFTER MAY 1, OR ARE LACKING DOCUMENTATION, EXCEPT WITH PRIOR APPROVAL FROM THE PROVINCE GOVERNOR.** The criteria designated as minimum standards must be completed in their entirety in order for consideration to be given. Once the minimum standards are met, final discretion in the awarding of citations lies solely with the province governor.
